### Fishing tourney nets plenty of carp

Bow fishermen and women from near and far turned out for the Prior Lake-Spring Lake Watershed District's first annual Carp Fishing Tournament on June 2. Twenty-one ambitious teams took to three lakes in the Prior Lake area with hopes to snatch the most carp and claim the \$1,000 grand prize.

Between the strong winds and cloudless skies, the tournament was a challenge for some, but persistence and skill paid off during the four-hour time limit to catch as many carp as possible on Prior Lake, Spring Lake and Fish Lake.

Winners were determined by most weight caught, and a prize was awarded for biggest carp caught. The first place prize of \$1,000 was awarded to Team Kzaley, who caught 17 carp with a combined weight of 237 pounds.

Teams Killing Time and Arrowfin took \$500 for second and third place, respectively, and Team Fernshot took \$250 at fourth. Biggest fish went to Team Back Country Bowfishing, an under-18 team, who picked up the largest carp at 28.8 pounds and 91 centimeters.

In total, 1,464 pounds of carp (107 fish) were removed from the three lakes.

Removing carp and promoting awareness of the destructive nature of the invasive fish was the main goal of the event, but another benefit was increasing the understanding of the carp

population in and around Prior Lake. In the winter of 2011-12, the watershed district, with the help of students from Prior Lake-Savage Area Schools, caught and tagged more than 1,700 fish in Spring Lake. Since then, fish with the distinctive tags and clipped fins have turned up in Spring and Prior lakes, and as far away as Jeffers Pond.

During the weigh-in tournament, volunteers kept their eyes open for the tagged fish, and spotted two carp with clipped fins. This will help to create an estimate of the number of carp in the lakes, and guide decisions about what should be done in the future. The watershed district is already planning future commercial seining (netting) to remove carp from Spring Lake; these wily competitors to our native fish will be facing a tough fight in the years to come.

After the tournament, the 1,464 pounds of carp were collected by Buckingham

Waste and transported to the Shakopee Mdewakanton Sioux Community (SMSC) Organics Recycling Facility, where the carp will be incorporated with other organic material and turned into compost, a nutrient-rich soil. Nora Boyle of Shakopee is the 2013 "Best Mom on Wheels.' To recognize exceptional

parents who defy the limitations of paralysis, the Christopher and Dana Reeve Foundation conducts Best Mom on Wheels and Best Dad on Wheels contests annually. For the moms, the contest looks to honor "amazing mother figures living with paralysis."

for trailers Boyle, 35, who is married to Jesse Boyle, leads a full and active life, just like most mothers of two children, except she does things from her wheelchair. She was in a car accident at age 16 on the way to school. She rolled her car and was thrown from it, breaking her back and crushing her spinal cord.

Boyle is a special education teacher's aide at an elementary school, a Girl Scout leader and loves going on scrapbooking retreats with her girlfriends. She doesn't see herself any differently than any other mom, getting involved in whatever her two kids are doing. Her children are Owen, 10, and Debbie, 12.

"I think it's just my kids. They're in a lot of stuff and I like to be involved in their lives," Boyle said. "If I can, ever, I try to volunteer at my kids
